In an inspiring Lowcountry spin on Extreme Makeover, several of our own citizens recently sprang to action to give four deserving families a place to call home. East Cooper Habitat for Humanity recently collaborated with the Trident Home Builders Association to challenge local builders to construct four homes in one week. The four builders to accept the challenge were John Wieland Homes and Neighborhoods, The I'On Group, Structures Building Company, and The J.D. Smith Company, Inc. The homes, located on McAdams Court in Mt. Pleasant, were finished in impressive fashion over the course of May 3 through May 10, and now house four hard-working families from the community.
