The Living Room

Design Trick: Pull the palette all the way through a room—essential for cohesion in an open space. Here, a poppy-orange chair and plum pillows echo the stairwell and den beyond.

Favorite Detail: This sealed, direct-vent (chimney-free) gas fireplace decreases air pollution and increases energy efficiency by preventing heated air from slipping outside.

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The Stairwell

Design Trick: Opt for stencil-painted walls as a creative alternative to wallpaper. Designer Angie Hranowsky had a local artist interpret a pricey paper's design with shimmery gold palm fronds and leaves that enliven a coral background.

Favorite Detail: Angle found this salvaged newel post online: sa1969.com.

NEXT The Kitchen



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The Kitchen

Designer Trick: This quartz countertop is naturally stain-resistant and is certified as a safe food-prep surface. We love how the quartz surface extends to the cabinet's baseboard on each side.

Favorite Detail: tiling an entire wall, not just the backsplash. We love how this expanse of tile transforms the kitchen's back wall into a textured mosaic.

NEXT The Dining Room



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The Dining Room

Designer Trick: Emphasize the height of the space with objects such as a pair of extra-tall candlestick lamps. They draw the eye up.

Favorite Detail: The bold portrait by Molly B. Right, fashioned entirely from bottlecaps (even the eyes!). So intricate up close, so striking from afar.

NEXT The Half Bathroom



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The Half Bathroom

Designer Trick: Paint PVC pipes to mimic the color of copper pipes when they're visible, as they are in the bath off the den.

Favorite Detail: The single sconce over the mirror. It casts a softer glow and makes room for a larger mirror.

NEXT The Master Bedroom



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The Master Bedroom

Designer Trick: This canopy is deceptively simple. Angie had a plywood "top" wrapped with fabric. A skirt, the back panel, and corner panels simply drape from the top. The entire thing hangs from the ceiling with chains that Angie covered with ruched sleeves.


Favorite Detail: the vintage rattan headboard—it dresses down all that silk and fabric. It's all about creating a high-low mix.

NEXT The Master Bathroom



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The Master Bathroom

Designer Trick: Keep the look casual by propping up artwork against the wall instead of hanging it. This trick works especially well with a pair of similar looking but different sized prints, such as in this bathroom.

Favorite Details: the brass accents in the sexy sconces, sink faucets, and cabinetry hardware—just a touch of luxe in an otherwise quiet room.

NEXT The Guest Bedroom



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The Guest Bedroom

Designer Trick: Pair a punchy fabric with a warm mocha paint color. The neutral hue makes the yellow, turquoise, and magenta tones in this pattern pop—and it's a more modern, less expected backdrop than a color pulled from the fabric would have been.

Favorite Detail: Going skirtless and opting for a bedspread that kisses the floor—so '50s, so chic!

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The Guest Bathroom

Designer Trick: Create a gilded mirror by having mirrored glass cut out to fit a frame coated in metallic paint.

Favorite Detail: The chest-style sink console in the guest bath, which looks like a converted antique.

NEXT The Courtyard



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The Courtyard

Designer Trick: Raised beds lend a sculptural quality to plantings and double as extra seating.

Favorite Detail: Planting between pavers. Soften hardscape with low-maintenance strips of green between easy-to-install concrete squares.

NEXT The Den



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The Den

Designer Trick: Paint every surface—walls, trim, and bookcases—one rich color like this dark eggplant for a seamless look.


Favorite Detail: A subtle, wave-patterned trim edging the bottom of the all-white sofas. Little details can have a huge impact.

The Exterior

Designer Trick: Combining stucco and fiber-cement planked siding (rot-resistant—a must on the coast). High style and low maintenance!

Favorite Detail: A permeable strip of creeping jasmine, a hardier groundcover than grass, to the tabby-paved driveways to absorb rainwater and reduce runoff.

Take a tour of the Exterior and Courtyard.
